Though The Foundation has embraced substantial change this year, we remain committed to partnering with organizations and programs that are based in education, research and community benefit. We also continue to prioritize our five focus areas which include; injury prevention, abuse and neglect, oncology and cardiology research, wellness and nutrition and mental health.

As conversations circulate in the news and headlines around issues in mental health, this focus area has innately grown for us. Michigan's entire mental health support system remains underfunded and under capacity; more resources are required to care for the children in our community. Knowingly, this year, we made significant movement to help close the gap. The Foundation increased funding for related programs and took action to assemble professionals and advocates to bring awareness and spread knowledge to the community. We are excited to share details about these efforts in the coming pages of this report.

It has been a tremendous year of learning, growing and achieving. The Foundation is now doing more than ever to improve the health and well-being of children and families; and while there is much to be celebrated, we are always looking to do more and increase our impact as we continue this important journey.

Addressing access to care for children and adolescents with mental health illnesses remains a serious challenge. We have made deliberate efforts to advance change in this area.

Through advocacy and community involvement, the behavioral health community has made tremendous strides in beginning to reduce stigma, developing best practices and advocating for policy reform to improve the lives of children and adolescents with mental illnesses. But there is still work to be done.



In a vulnerable environment like a college campus, access to sober living and resources to maintain sobriety are essential - we are happy to support students in the Collegiate Recovery Community at Michigan State University.

Doctors and allied professionals need more resources to care for children with mental health needs in our community. In 2019, The Children's Foundation prioritized funding programs that helped alleviate this burden, increasing funding for mental health related programs by 19%.

Most significantly, The Foundation helped coordinate the first grant for the Jamie Daniels Foundation, which provided resources to the Collegiate Recovery Community at Michigan State University. This program provides a safe and supportive campus community so that students in substance abuse recovery can successfully achieve their academic, personal and professional goals.



For the Jamie Daniels Foundation, 2019 was a monumental year; it was the first year that involved not only strategy and planning, but implementation. We have worked collaboratively to raise awareness about substance abuse, addressing the overwhelming stigma. Our most noteworthy effort was hosting our first signature event, The Celebrity Roast of Mickey Redmond which helped raise nearly \$250,000. A special thanks to our presenting sponsor, Delta Dental of Michigan, who helped us to move our mission forward. Funds raised will be put towards programming that supports our mission, such as the Collegiate Recovery Community at Michigan State University which was our first grant recipient.



Still, addressing access to care for children and adolescents with mental health illnesses remains a challenge. In efforts to help make Michigan a leader in this area, we helped launch the "Michigan Advocates for Youth Behavioral Health." The new coalition of organizations and advocates are determined to end stigma, change attitudes towards mental illness and break down barriers to quality behavioral health care for young people. Our first project convened the 2019 Child & Adolescent Behavioral Health Summit in May,

which helped educate approximately 200 parents, educators and providers about these important issues.

When individuals become better educated about mental health needs, attitudes change. The Foundation is persistent about championing programs that provide quality care and support, so that children and teens with behavioral health challenges can lead hopeful and fulfilling lives.



Last year, we introduced a new, enlightening event to assemble physicians, educators and families at the Child and Adolescent Behavioral Health Summit. It was an informative and impactful program which included panelists and keynote speakers who discussed a range of topics. From substance abuse, confronting the opioid epidemic and the impact of addiction on family, to issues in public health such as suicide and social determinants, attendees gained knowledge and perspective, helping them to better confront and address these important issues in their day-to-day.

# Dynamic collaborations lend our expertise and align the efforts of multiple organizations to benefit more children and families.

As The Children's Foundation continues to evolve, we are pushed to be bold and creative as we deploy our resources to broaden our reach in new and unique ways. It is through collaborative efforts with other community organizations that we can increase our effectiveness and help more children and families. In 2019, we established the following initiatives that help to raise awareness of our mission.





DETROIT GOLF CLUB JUNE 25 - 30, 2019 During a time when Detroit was visible on the national stage, The Children's Foundation had the unique opportunity to participate with the Rocket Mortgage Classic creating an opportunity for brand recognition and collaboration with local organizations. There, we invited children from local charities, including some of our Little Champions, to attend a Kids Clinic where they learned skills and techniques from golf professionals. Little Champions also attended the 313 Celebrity Challenge where they had a meet and greet with multiple celebrities playing, as well as walked the course.

# In 2019, The Foundation established new, exciting relationships.

#### **Grand Rapids Drive**

Through a newly established collaboration with the Grand Rapids Drive, The Children's Foundation now has increased brand recognition in West Michigan. This is essential as we work to further build our presence and establish more partnerships in this region of the state and provides an additional special experience for Little Champions.

#### **Paul W. Smith Golf Classic**

The Foundation partnered with iconic local radio personality, WJR's Paul W. Smith for his annual golf tournament held at the Detroit Golf Club. The event brought together a total of 65 participating teams, raising more than \$400,000 for four different children's charities including The Children's Foundation, as well as the Detroit Police Athletic League, the Children's Center and Variety Detroit.

Our radio show, Caring for Kids on WJR, has proved to be an influential platform to raise awareness and educate listeners about important issues facing today's youth. Hosted by President and CEO, Larry Burns, we invite guests who are experts in their field to have informative conversations. Topics of conversation in 2019 have included corruption in substance abuse rehabilitation to how one organization is using golf to provide mentorship to adolescents. We hosted more than 30 guests throughout the year who shared their knowledge, helping us to inform the community and create change on behalf of children.

#### The Farm at St. Joseph Mercy Hospital

Located on 26 acres of the St. Joseph Mercy
Ann Arbor campus, The Farm serves as a food hub
in a community-based hospital addressing various
needs for at-risk families. The Farm facilitates a
consortium of ten farms that provide produce for a
community supported agriculture (CSA) program.
CSAs connect consumers directly to farmers
and can be thought of as a produce subscription
service. Consumers buy in at the beginning of the
season then receive a share of the season's produce

in weekly installments during the summer and fall. Besides offering more than 65 varieties of produce, the CSA educates families about nutrition, exercise and healthy lifestyles.

To help with their efforts, The Foundation funded a 4x4 utility vehicle, small enough to perform tasks a tractor would and transport produce across the hospital campus. We also funded a walk-in cooler to store shares allowing The Farm to expand the CSA, and supported shares for 30 food insecure families.



Our partnerships create a collective strength and provide a broader impact on the well-being of children and families in Michigan.



#### **Figure Skating Detroit**

Astoundingly, half of children in Detroit do not have access to physical education classes and one in five do not regularly eat fruit and vegetables, according to a 2013 Center for Disease Control report. For young women, there is a further lack of access to positive, quality exercise experiences.

To address these needs, we partnered with Figure Skating in Detroit to provide an after school program, I Can Excel (ICE), for approximately 60 female participants ages 6-15. During the school year, participants attend workshops with a fitness and nutrition instructor to learn about nutrition over a healthy snack, and go on excursions such as rock climbing or visiting a farmer's market. Our goal is to teach young girls how to take control of their health in both the short and long-term.



#### Children's Hospital of Michigan - NFANT Feeding System

Children's Hospital of Michigan continues to lead the way as they advance the health of children, and we take pride in helping them provide the best care for patients. One way we have done this is supporting a pilot program to help infants in the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit to achieve full oral nutrition quicker and more consistently, decreasing hospital admission days and the need to be discharged with nasal gastric feeding tube.

Last year, ten patients utilized the NFANT Feeding System, a cue-based feeding approach that provides real time biofeedback and objective metrics to help clinicians guide premature infants to a safe, healthy transition to independent oral feeding. This technology is driving the standard of care, providing objective research data, which previously driven by personal experience.

### Creating collaborative partnerships to benefit our communities.







## To keep our mission alive and supported, we must prioritize fundraising and engage our donors.

For The Children's Foundation, 2019 was a year of reevaluation and setting new courses. In addition to reflecting upon our goals, we have examined how to reach them. This ultimately led us to reinvent how we engage donors, as well as how we approach our major gift program, individual giving and annual giving. To do this, we sought to establish opportunities for trustees and donors of The Foundation to help create guide new processes:

#### **Stewardship Committee**

The Stewardship Committee was established to ensure donors are honored by how The Foundation recognizes, acknowledges and celebrates them and their contributions to the health and wellness of children. Comprised of approximately 10 members, the committee meets regularly to discuss a variety of strategies including direct mail and email campaigns. They work to develop programming and metrics, evaluate progress, establish targets and plan according to best-practices for years to come.

#### **Entrepreneurs 4 Kids**

Entrepreneurs 4 Kids (E4K) is an affinity group designed by entrepreneurs for entrepreneurs, providing a unique and shared experience in support of kids' causes. Their inaugural focus is on middle and high school students in communities with limited resources. E4K brings together small business leaders who are looking for something more dynamic and far reaching than the episodic requests from hundreds of nonprofits. It is built on the premise of relationships and networking investment while giving back and encouraging future generations of kids to dream and ultimately obtain their own entrepreneurial career path.



# We will continue to add diverse, unique perspectives to maintain success.

The Children's Foundation Board of Trustees added five new, talented professionals to help guide our Foundation forward. ### First round grant cycle for 2020 with a focus on behavioral and mental health issues.

In early January, we announced our first round of grants for 2020. The Children's Foundation awarded nearly \$4 million divided among approximately 93 grants which supported organizations and projects seeking to improve the well-being of children in our state.
